## READING COMPREHENSION

## The mosquito

The word "mosquito" comes from the Spanish "little fly". There are over 3,500 species of mosquitoes described from different parts of the world.

Like all flies, mosquitoes go through four stages in their life cycle: egg, lava, pupa and adult. In most species, adult females lay their eggs in standing water; others attach their eggs to aquatic plants. Each species selects the situation of the water into which it lays its eggs according to its own ecological adaptations.

All mosquitoes have slender bodies with three segments: head, torax and abdomen.


The first three stages (egg, larva and pupa) are largely aquatic. These stages typically last from 5 to 14 days. The period of development from egg to adult varies among species and is strongly influenced by ambient temperature. A typical period of development in tropical conditions would be 40 days or more.

Depending on weather conditions, adults can live from a week to several months.
Although there are important differences between the members of the respective families, the females of many species of blood-sucking mosquitoes are dangerous for humans. But not all of them are dangerous. Some species of mosquitoes are not bloodsuckers and some of those that suck blood do not transmit diseases. Some others, such as Toxorhynchites, are beneficial predators of other mosquitoes.

Artificial water containers (flowerpots, old bottles or tires...) are important breeding places for mosquitoes and they are also the cause of serious human diseases. The species of Aedes are very dangerous, because they transmit dengue and yellow fever.

Nowadays control measures focus on mosquito species that cause human diseases. Several scientists have suggested that the complete eradication of mosquitoes would not have serious ecological consequences and it would be the end of a serious problem. Dengue and yellow fever affect more than 100 countries and, unfortunately, the number of infected people is still increasing.

## Joshua Bell

This is a real story. Joshua Bell playing at the metro station.
This experience was organized by the Washington Post as part of a social experiment about perception, taste and priorities of people. They wanted to know if we can perceive beauty or recognize talent in an unexpected context.

A man sat at a metro station in Washington and started to play the violin; it was a cold January morning. He played six Bach pieces for about 45 minutes. During that time, thousands of people went through the station, most of them on their way to work.

After three minutes a middle aged man noticed there was a musician playing. He stopped for a few seconds and then went quickly into the station.

A minute later, the violinist received his first dollar tip: a young woman threw
 the money without stopping and continued to walk.

A few minutes later, a man stopped to listen to him, but after a few seconds he looked at his watch and started to walk again. He was late for work.

The one who paid the most attention was a 3 year old boy. He stopped but his mother pushed hard and the child continued walking, turning his head all the time. This action was repeated by several other children. All the parents, without exception, forced them to move on.

In the 45 minutes the musician played, only 6 people stopped and stayed for a while. About 20 gave him money but continued to walk. He collected $\$ 32$. When he finished playing, no one noticed it. No one applauded.

The violinist was Joshua Bell, one of the top musicians in the world. He played one of the most difficult pieces ever written, using a 3.5 million dollars violin handcrafted by Antonio Stradivari in 1713.

Two days before this experiencie in the subway, he played in a theater in Boston. One seat ticket was $\$ 100$.
